LIFTING OF RESTRICTION ON IMPORTS OF POULTRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS FROM GERMANY

Please refer to our letter dated 14 Oct 2014 and 12 Nov 2014.

We are pleased to inform you that the previous LPAI and HPAI outbreaks in Germany had been resolved. However, another H7N7 low pathogenic avian influenza outbreak was reported in a layer farm in Herzlake, Landkries Emsland, Lower Saxonyoutbreak, Germany.

In view of this outbreak, AVA will lift the import restriction imposed on 14 Oct 2014 and 12 Nov 2014, and instead impose a temporary restriction on the importation of poultry and poultry products from the 1km radius restricted area around the premises affected with LPAI, with immediate effect.

Heat-processed poultry products, which meet the requirements for heat inactivation of AI virus, will not be affected. For import from unaffected areas in Germany, additional certification is required on the veterinary health certificate as listed on Annex 1.

Annex 1

The additional certification should state on the Veterinary Health Certificate:

- a. Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) and H5 and H7 low pathogenicity avian influenza (LPAI) are notifiable diseases in the country of export.
- b. The birds from which the meat was sourced were not vaccinated against Notifiable (H5 and H7) subtypes of avian influenza (AI), as defined by the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE).
- c. The poultry meat and meat products were not derived from birds originating from the 1 km radius restricted area around the LPAI affected premises.
- d. There have been no outbreaks of HPAI involving poultry in the country of origin in the three months prior to slaughter.
- e. The poultry from which the meat was derived were born, raised, and slaughtered in Germany, or were legally imported as day old chicks from countries with equivalent poultry health status.
