OUTBREAK OF AVIAN INFLUENZA (AI) IN NETHERLANDS

Please refer to our letter dated 23 Dec 2016.

The Netherlands has reported another outbreak of H5 Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in a layer farm in Zoeterwoude, in the Province of Zuid Holland.

In view of the outbreak, AVA will impose a temporary restriction on the importation of poultry and poultry products to the 10 km radius restricted area around the affected premises in Zoeterwoude, Zuid Holland in the Netherlands, with immediate effect. Heat-processed poultry products, which meet the requirements for heat inactivation of AI virus, will not be affected. For import from unaffected areas in the Netherlands, additional certification is required on the veterinary health certificate as listed on Annex 1.

Annex 1

The additional certification should state on the Veterinary Health Certificate:

- a) Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) and H5 and H7 low pathogenicity avian influenza (LPAI) are notifiable diseases in the country of export.
- b) The birds from which the meat was sourced were not vaccinated against H5 and H7 subtypes of avian influenza (AI), as defined by the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE).
- c) The poultry meat and meat products were not derived from birds originating from 10 km radius restricted area around the affected premises in the following regions:
 - Biddinghuizen, Flevoland
 - Abbega, Friesland
 - Kamperveen, Overijssel
 - Hiaure, Friesland
 - Boven Leeuwen, Gelderland and
 - Zoeterwoude, Zuid Holland
- d) The poultry from which the meat was derived were born, raised, and slaughtered in Netherlands, or were legally imported as day old chicks from countries with equivalent poultry health status.
