OUTBREAK OF AVIAN INFLUENZA (AI) IN VORDINGBORG MUNICIPALITY, DENMARK

Please refer to our letter dated 9 May 2018.

Denmark reported another outbreak of H5 Low Pathogenicity Avian Influenza (LPAI) in a mallard ducking holding near the town Faksinge, in Vordingborg municipality in the southern part of Zealand.

In view of the outbreak, AVA will impose a temporary restriction on the importation of poultry and poultry products to the 1 km restricted area around the affected premises in Vordingborg municipality, Denmark, with effect from 26 June 2018. Heat-processed poultry products, which meet the requirements for destruction of AI virus, will not be affected by the import restriction. For import from unaffected areas in Denmark, additional certification is required on the veterinary health certificate as listed on Annex 1.

Annex 1

The additional certification should state on the Veterinary Health Certificate:

- a. Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) and H5 and H7 low pathogenicity avian influenza (LPAI) are notifiable diseases in the country of export.
- b. The birds from which the meat was sourced were not vaccinated against H5 and H7 subtypes of avian influenza (AI), as defined by the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE).
- c. The poultry meat and meat products were not derived from birds originating from the 1 km radius restricted area around the affected premises in Vordingborg municipality and Holstebro municipality.
- d. The poultry from which the meat was derived were born, raised, and slaughtered in Denmark, or were legally imported as day old chicks from countries with equivalent poultry health status.
